

Swaziland: Group calls for banks to recognize local needs

Yonge Nawe Environmental Action Group posted Day of Action information on their website to outline the importance of the day and current issues of water planning and development in Swaziland and other African countries. They are particularly concerned with the Lesotho Highlands Water Project, one of the most massive infrastructure projects funded by the World Bank in sub-Saharan Africa. The group calls for the World Bank, IMF and regional financiers, such as the Development Bank of Southern Africa, to finance only "good dams," dams that address the needs of the poor majority, dams which are relevant to meeting the water supply needs of rural people. They also ask these banks to finance alternatives to dams.

On Thursday, March 11, El?as Diaz Pe?a (Sobrevivencia, Friends of the Earth, Paraguay) appeared on LT8 Radio Rosary. Brazil: Actions organized by The Brazilian Movement for Dam Affected People (MAB)

Affected families block

highway to demand change

Families affected by Serra da Mesa and Cana Brava dams have blocked the Belém-Brasília highway; demanding changes in the national energy model and reparations for all the families who have lost their lands due to the construction of dams. MAB also organized other protests at Castanhão dam, Ceará state and in the Jequitinhonha valley, Minas Gerais state. In Rondônia state, meetings are taking place to discuss impacts of dams on the Madeira River in the Amazon.

Affected people demand participation

300 affected by Peixe Angical dam on the Tocantins River, Brazil, are protesting at the dam construction site. The dam, a project of EDP (a Portuguese electric company) and the Brazilian state company Furnas, is 40% constructed, but a dialogue between the company and affected people has yet to begin.

Affected people protest outside governor's palace

MAB has mounted a camp in front of the State Legislature of Minas Gerais, Brazil, in Belo Horizonte. They marched to the governor's palace to protest the state's plan to build 300, mostly small dams, but of significant social and environmental impact.

Affected people take Manso Dam

1,200 affected by Manso Dam, operated by state electric company Furnas in Mato Grosso, Brazil, have taken over the dam. They say that 800 affected families never received compensation or resettlement,

and that resettlement lands granted were on poor soils inadequate for agriculture.

Blocking and locking dam builders out

Human road blocks in Paran? state included hundreds threatened by dams on the Chopin River, and affected by Salto Santiago, Salto Caxias, and Santo Os?rio dams. MAB has also locked the gate that provides access to the Estreito dam worksite. Alcoa, Billiton, Tractebel and others fund this particular dam.

Families unite to stop destruction by dams and their construction companies

About 900 families affected by Barra Grande, Campos Novos, and Machadinho dams and members of MAB blocked the roads leading into Curitibanos, Santa Catarina state to protest poor treatment that they are receiving from the construction companies.

Hundreds block road, calling for reparations

In the state of Rio Grande Do Sul, 300 families affected by Itauba and Dona Francisca dams blocked the road entering the town of J?lio de Castilhos, to protest the lack of efforts to compensate affected populations.

Hundreds of families occupy Tucuru? Dam

On March 15, 800 families traveled to the Tucuru? Hydroelectric Plant and occupied the dam in protest against the ill treatment of the Eletronorte, a national energy company, and the Ministry of Mines and Energy toward the affected population. The Tucuru? Dam, located on the River Tocantins, in the state of Par?, was constructed in the 1970?s and is one of the biggest hydroelectric plants in Brazil. Thousands of families had been dislocated without

receiving adequate reparations.

Endangered Tibagi River is blessed

The Tibagi River in the state of Parana, Brazil received "blessings" from representatives of churches, as part of the Day of Action. The Tibagi River is threatened by plans for four dams.

Chile: River tour and ceremony to save Rio Blanco

More than thirty people, including families, children and inhabitants of the region went to the site on the Blanco River where the Noranda company has projected to install a 116-meter-high dam that would flood at least 3,500 hectares of valleys including those of the Caro Lake, Desagüe River and Elizalde Lake. The activity included a long walk on which the participants learned about the many species of flora and fauna that would be destroyed once the dam was in place. There was also a ceremony to celebrate the river.

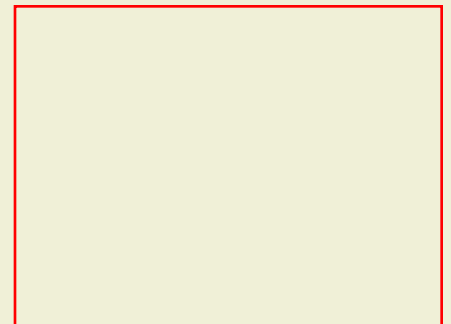

Guatemala: Human road block to stop dams in Peten

More than 500 habitants of the region of Peten, Guatemala blocked highways at different points of the main route, which runs from the oil region in the north, to the capital of the country. The road blocks were carried out for more than 8 hours, during which the participants demonstrated against the construction of a system of dams that is being proposed to be built in this biologically diverse and culturally rich area. The indigenous and campesino organizations involved demanded that all of the information about the planned projects be made public, while up until now knowledge of the involved companies has been kept quiet, although it is supposed that they are transnational corporations.

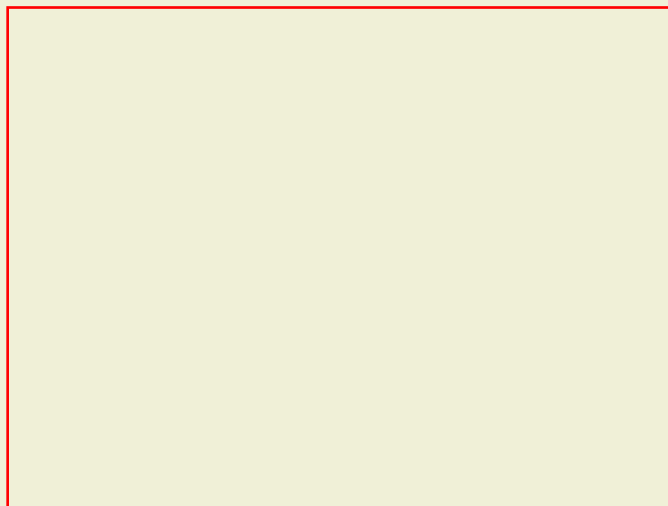

India: March against Ken River linking plan

Members of the National Alliance of Peoples Movements (NAPM) and South Asia Network on Dams, Rivers and People (SANDRP) hosted a week against large dams during March 14–20, including activities and daily speakers. A march against India's huge river linking project was organized from Banda, Uttar Pradesh to Patna in the state of Bihar from March 14 to March 19. This project proposes the linkage of 36 rivers in India to divert water from major rivers, including the Ganges and Brahmaputra. Several major dams and more than 1,000 kilometers of canals are envisioned, all of which can lead to many environmental and social problems.

India: Meeting to help those displaced by Tehri Dam

On March 14, Matu People's organization held a meeting on the problems caused by displacement in Uttarakhand due to the Tehri Dam and hundreds of other smaller dams that are currently under construction. The relocation programs are causing daily agitation among citizens because many are resisting removal and trying to stay in their homes.
